The Optimistic Gardener

Spring is the perfect time to turn over a new leaf

Well - Spring is on its way. Hooray! We've endured the dreich days of December with its 15 hour long nights and watched the garden go to sleep for a while. Although this year it seemed to be a light doze. I was still eating our autumn raspberries in the early part of December and on New Year's Day I counted 26 varieties of plant in flower in the High Trees garden.

Although January ought to be a time for catching up with my violin practice and finishing that patchwork quilt I started three years ago but haven't quite finished, there is still much to do in the garden. As I've mentioned before in these articles, you should sow the seed of onions on Boxing Day I guess this is because the days are starting to get longer and it gives the onion plant a long growing season in order to bulk up into good sized bulbs. Well this year I was in Cheshire on Boxing Day, so the first available day to sow them was 2nd January.

Now in January one place that is relatively warm in our garden is the insulated greenhouse - sparkling in its newly cleaned state and adorned with a fresh lining of horticultural bubble wrap. We heat this greenhouse for the early part of

the year - not to tropical temperatures but just so it doesn't go down below 7 degrees C - so it is the perfect spot in which to linger and pretend I am gardening.

As well as the onions I have sown sweet peas. As usual I was busy making cider and membrillo in October last year when I should have been sowing the sweet peas and putting them into a cold frame to develop slowly over the winter months. Well that's my excuse! However all is not lost. It is still possible to sow sweet peas in January or February.

They are fully hardy and don't need to be mollycoddled (such a lovely word!). There is a lot of baloney (there's another one!) written about chipping a small nick in the seeds before planting them, or soaking them overnight in tepid water then leaving them to germinate on some wet kitchen towel. I don't bother with any of this palaver (what a rich language we have!) and simply sow the seeds in deep pots using seed compost; it helps to use deep pots to encourage the roots to go downwards and to avoid root disturbance when you plant them. This year I have used toilet roll tubes and plan to put the whole thing in the ground when I plant them out.

Another job which I like to do in late January or early February is to sow the exotic vegetables of the Ratatouille family (not strictly a scientific term but you know what I mean!) This part of the year is where my small propagator is working overtime. I

tend to grow my tomato plants in the green-house these days since, if I grow them outdoors, they invariably get a dose of blight - the same pathogen which nobbles potatoes in damp years. It appears to be endemic in Lake Lane but the spores don't seem to find their way into the greenhouse. The other seeds which jostle for space in the propagator are sweet peppers and aubergines. I always grow far too many. After repotting six of each type for personal consumption I find that I can easily give the rest away. If you look on Google Earth at High Trees (street view) you will see my last year's excess aubergine crop which disappeared overnight after my

Other jobs I could be doing instead of lurking in the greenhouse include pruning roses and wisteria (if I had one) and removing last year's leaves from my hellebores so the new blooms are more visible. My hellebores are quite promiscuous so I have

flowers unfurling and pointing the way to Spring. And there are some nowadays, not so modest, with blooms that are upward facing. Our very own local nursery in Walberton have bred one called Walberton's Rosemary.



They also look very good in a pot with a few cyclamen, and at the end of their flowering will appreciate joining their friends in the borders. One of the things I love to do with the flowerheads of hellebore is to float them in a large shallow bowl as this way you can see their intricate patterns in all their glory.



And they are a great source of nectar for bees when they venture out on warm days in January and February.



And just in case you read this article for any sensible suggestions as to what to do in the garden, here is a list of jobs which you can be getting on with in your own garden in February. And if you've got any energy left after doing all those things, then you can get on with those rainy day projects like a patchwork quilt!

What to do in the garden in February

- Now is the time to prune your Wisteria
- Plant your Lily and Allium bulbs
- Start chitting potatoes in a bright, cool, frost-free place
- Continue to plant raspberry canes for the summer
- · Prepare vegetable seed beds, and sow some vegetables under cover
- Protect blossom on apricots, nectarines and peaches
- Net fruit and vegetable crops to keep the birds off
- · Prune winter-flowering shrubs that have finished flowering
- Divide bulbs such as snowdrops and plant those that need planting 'in-the-green'
- Prune evergreen hedges and renovate overgrown deciduous hedges
- Prune conservatory climbers such as bougainvillea
- Cut back deciduous grasses left over winter, remove dead grass from evergreen grasses

Chairman's Report

The Parish Council on 3rd of December last year began with a presentation and demonstration on how to operate the new de-fibrilator which is now available outside the entrance of the Village Hall. Its location has now been registered with the SECAS so they now are aware of its existence and availability. The session was attended by about 20 members of the Community which is encouraging, and it transpired that is a relatively simple thing to do.

The news of the possible new housing planned on Boxgrove Farm land included in the District Local Plan Review was greeted with some scepticism, particularly with regard to the proposed access to the 50 homes proposed for this site! There are details of the housing which has taken place in the Parish over the past 34 years in the minutes of the December meeting.

Regretfully Fly Tipping is becoming more prevalent in the District again and a particularly bad case was about 40 cubic metres of soil and other building waste tipped in a locked field in Thicket Lane. That represented about 3 skip loads!

The electrics in the Sports Pavilion have been inspected, tested and CONDEMNED. Arrangements have been made to replace the out of date non compliant switchboard, which should be completed mid January.

We are approaching the end of the public consultation period of the District Local Plan: it ends on 7th February, so if anybody wishes to comment or criticise the content of the document, representations must be in by that date. A copy of the Review, Preferred Approach has been available locally since the end of November.

You should all have noticed the new splendid white 'gates' to the north and south entrances to Boxgrove and the recently added Village Name signs with the polite message. These have been one of the results of the Parish Traffic Calming Group volunteers' efforts to make Boxgrove a safer place. These gate are intended to give the Village a increased 'sense of place'. They were erected by a couple of Balfour Beatty staff as part of a "Community Spirit Initiative" completely free of charge. A couple of other signposts in the Village were either introduced or replaced; BB and WSCC Highways have been thanked for this gesture. More work is on the agenda for a couple of safer crossing places across The Street. Equally, work is progressing at a good pace to complete a similar plan for Halnaker. Discussion has already taken place with Chris Dye, our Area Highways Manager, and the completed plans should be ready to put to WSCC Highways for approval and potential funding in March.

The path leading to the Priory ruins and other residences once again is in a deplorable condition and the Parish Clerk wrote a severe letter to English Heritage and at least this has resulted in a potential meeting with Alison Naylor, the newly appointed Sites Manager fo EH, the actual date to be fixed imminently. I must add that I have never seen this pathway in such a dangerous condition. A member of the public attending the January PC meeting informed us that, to avoid one of the 'craters' in the pathway, she accidentally hit the post and chain fencing damaging her car as well as the fencing.

Finally, a letter from Highways England has confirmed that no work (subject to funding) will take place to the A27 Chichester By-pass for at least 5 years and any consideration of a Northern By-pass has been completely ruled out.

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Boxgrove Neighbourhood Plan Update January 2019

As agreed at the December Parish Council meeting our clerk wrote to Mike Allgrove at CDC to chase the previous unanswered correspondence.

A response was finally received on 17 Dec. This advised that the Habitats Reg assessment had been completed and that potentially a SEA would be required. This is about any effects that our plan may have on the bats' habitat in the long disused Singleton and Cocking railway tunnels. He also mentioned that in terms of their priorities the Selsey and Westbourne NP's are ahead of Boxgrove. We will be given a timetable for our plan after their SEA's have been completed.

On 18 Dec 2018, Gillian Keegan made a reply to my request for help dated 6 Nov 2018. This reply advised that my request would be investigated at a meeting in the New Year with the relevant leaders at CDC. To date nothing further has been received.

A further email was received on 18 Dec 2018, also from Mike Allgrove's office stating that the screening indicated that our NP would not impact on the habitat concerned and that this would be signed off and sent to our plan examiner. This clearly seemed to contradict with the previous advice and we have asked for clarification.

Today, 7 Jan, I was advised that we would be sent a further email explaining this complicated situation. Clearly CDC are themselves having difficulty with this issue.

In the meantime, Chichester District Council have embarked on the consultation process for their own Chichester Local Plan Review Preferred Approach Consultation - December 2018 to February 2019. This is a 5 year review of their made plan which all Neighbourhood Plans will need to comply with or have housing imposed. It is this document which requires another 50 houses in Boxgrove during 1-5 years increasing to 115 in total over 5-10 years. This consultation lasts until 7 February 2019. Comments should be made through the portal at the web address below or local events.

Clearly, one issue is how thousands more houses can be justified and what assurances we can be given for infrastructure improvements such as the A27, alternative transport and waste management being in place beforehand.

The Neighbourhood Plan process is supposed to be about local democracy. If you have strong feelings about this subject, please participate in the consultation and/or write to your councillor and/or MP.

Boxgrove and HalnakerTraffic Calming Group Update - February 2019

The Boxgrove village gates are now fully installed and new village signs have also been fitted to complete the installation. Thanks to WSCC Highways and Balfour Beatty for all their assistance and support of this project.



The Speed Indicator Device (SID) is now being deployed around Boxgrove at various WSCC approved sites on fixed posts for a few days at a time to remind drivers of their speed. Plans are underway for a similar approach in Halnaker.

A Community Highway Scheme for traffic calming actions in Halnaker is being progressed:

- The team met with West Sussex Highways on Jan 7th to discuss issues/ideas and received valuable feedback from the Highways Manager.
- Halnaker residents were invited to a Public consultation session on January 26th at the Old Store Guest House in Halnaker to share their views on the proposals with the team.
- The submission will be made by end of March for the October 2019 approval process.

Community speed watch commenced again in January in both Boxgrove and Halnaker. A second radar gun has been purchased by the Parish Council and is now operational in Halnaker and making it possible for two Community Speed Watch teams to operate independently. Do you have two hours to spare each week or month to join the team?

This last month 110 of the vehicles reported for speeding by the speed watch teams were sent a letter by the Police. Maximum speed recorded was 62mph in Halnaker, where speeding is still a major issue.

A drop kerb application for Halnaker, across the road from the pub, has been approved and will make it easier to cross the road at this busy location.

A proposal to relocate the Boxgrove southern (northbound) bus stop to a safer location has initially been rejected by WSCC Highways. A re-submission has been developed and the team are waiting for a response.

Minutes of Boxgrove Parish Council meetings

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Chino says, "Due to the last eruption, we lost 5,000 hives, which is a significant number for the beekeepers in that area of Southern Chile. Luckily, because we are a co-operative, we don't just rely on one area for our production. We moved into blueberries so as to not put all of our eggs into one basket. It was a way of protecting ourselves 'just in case'. Never think your small contribution cannot make a difference. Every bee that enters one of our hives can only carry a very tiny amount of nectar. But when you open our hives and they are bursting with honey, you realise how each bee has played its part."

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Elderflower and Caramel Creams - serves 6

(with many thanks to Sue Jones)

Ingredients 225 ml double cream (whipped, but not too stiff)

300 ml Greek yoghurt 4 tablespoons icing sugar

2 tablespoons soft brown sugar 4½ tablespoons elderflower cordial

(Wafers or biscuits to serve)

Method I. Stir the cream and yoghurt together

2. Add the cordial and icing sugar

3. Divide between six glasses and chill in fridge

30-40 minutes before serving, sprinkle with brown sugar and return to the fridge. The sugar will melt to form a caramel sauce.

Serve with wafers or biscuits.

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
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
