#### From Father Ian

The coronation of Her Late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth II, happened before I was born, though I remember conversations about it, and descriptions of how grand it had all been, from various times in my childhood and youth. It had obviously made a very significant impact on my parents and their friends, and the fact that it was televised, obviously helped to imprint those memories. I do remember watching, a number of times, the film of the coronation which was hurriedly produced and distributed to cinemas within a few days of the ceremony.

1953 was, of course, not really that long after World War II, and the extensive deployment of service personnel from around, what was just becoming the Commonwealth, to parade and guard, and delineate the coronation route, spoke of a nation with military power and considerable influence on the world stage. That coronation was, of course, on a much grander scale than the present one will be, but nevertheless, it marks an event of extraordinary importance within the context of the political and religious structures of this country.

What does the monarchy mean to you and to me?

Certainly there are some who see it as unviable and anachronistic; an institution which is gradually becoming something of a soap opera. The press and other forms of mass media often conspire with this to attract more readers, listeners or viewers. They magnify, and sometimes distort the personal details of royal relationships, and in so doing, they are eroding much that, in past times, seemed praiseworthy.

But monarchy, at its core, is I believe stronger than the media. A very personification of obedience to God, and wise governing of people, is central to the Old Testament, in the persons of King Solomon and King David. It is an idea which can inspire and infuse nations with high ideals and stability, and Her Late Majesty, Queen Elizabeth, exercised her call to the throne to such effect and with huge integrity, in the service of her people.

As His Majesty, King Charles III, approaches his coronation, and in the months and years of his reign, let us support him with our confidence and prayers, recognizing that he serves as monarch under the One who is King of kings and Lord of lords.

Our 10.30am Mass on May 7<sup>th</sup> will, naturally, contain prayers for the King and Queen. At the end of that service (around 11.30am) we will be serving a glass of fizz, and soft drinks, and celebrating until 12noon. At 12noon we will have an anthem by the choir. Some prayers for the King and Queen, and will sing the National Anthem, finishing at about 12.15pm.

#### DO JOIN US AT ANY STAGE FOR THIS BRIEF CELEBRATION - YOU WILL BE VERY WELCOME

Vivat Rex. God save the King!

Making holy journeys is good for the soul, and there are several reasons for this.

Taking time out from our busy schedules, and looking at our lives from a new vantage point often helps us to see things in a fresh way; to identify our patterns of behaviour; the strengths and weaknesses of our personalities, and the choices that we make.

Being with others on pilgrimage provides opportunities for sharing ideas and observations, and sometimes wisdom. We strengthen our friendships and fellowships.

To make a holy journey to a holy place is especially rewarding because we are often responding to an invitation from the saints; those who have gone before us in faith and who have marked-out particular places where we might encounter, in a particular way, a new vision and energy for our discipleship.

Little Walsingham, in North Norfolk, is one such place. Indeed it is a place which still fizzes with spiritual energy. It was in this small Norfolk village that Our Lady, Mary, appeared to the Lady of the Manor, Richeldis de Faverches, in 1061. She instructed Richeldis to build a copy of the house in which she and her husband, Joseph, had lived with the boy Jesus. The place was quickly established as a shrine, and became widely known as a place of healing and holiness.

The Reformation saw the destruction of the shrine, and although the sense of holiness, and knowledge of the shrine's importance, never completely disappeared, it was not until the Anglo-Catholic revival that the shrine was restored in the 1920s, largely through the Anglican Vicar of Walsingham, Fr Alfred Hope-Patten.

In our own time, thousands of pilgrims flock to Walsingham - to the Anglican and Roman Catholic shrines, and there are some joint pilgrimages. Our own parish has an annual pilgrimage to the shrine, and a number of our regular worshippers make their own visits throughout the year.

You may have noticed a small statue of Mary in the Chantry chapel at Boxgrove. This is a copy of the statue of Mary and Jesus which sits in the shrine church at Walsingham, and Mary is invoked (her prayers requested) under the title of Our Lady of Walsingham.

#### FROM THE MARIPOSA TRUST

Saying Goodbye, (part of the Mariposa Trust) are coming to Chichester in May with an inaugural Baby loss remembrance and support service (part of a Nationwide chain of events). These events are extra special to us this year as this our tenth anniversary year!

The Mariposa Trust's core objective is to support people who have lost babies at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in infancy. It was founded in 2012, by Zoe and Andy Clark-Coates, who saw a critical lack of support for people like them, who had gone through baby loss. With over 258,000 babies being lost yearly in the UK alone, the charity needed to be able to offer not only a comprehensive package of befriending and support but also national baby loss remembrance services (called Saying Goodbye Services), for people to join together and remember the children they had lost. 5 years on, over 150 services have taken place at Cathedrals and Minsters across the UK, US, and France, and 2023 will see 21 services across England, Wales, Scotland and Ireland.

On the 13<sup>th</sup> May at 11am in Chichester Cathedral we will be hosting one of our Saying Goodbye Services and as this is the most local service to you this year we wanted to share this information with you.

So who is the service for?

Anyone who has either personally lost a baby at any stage of pregnancy, at birth, or in early years, or who has been affected by family members' or friends' loss. Whether the loss was recent or 80 years ago, everyone is welcome to attend. We have also extended the services, and gladly welcome anyone who is grieving the fact that they haven't had children. This may be due to circumstance, infertility, or for other reasons - but all are welcome. Babies and children are also invited to come with their families, as the Saying Goodbye service is truly a family event for all.

We know that as 1 in 4 women suffer miscarriage and baby loss, you will have contact with a significant number of people who have either personally suffered baby loss, or who have a partner or family member that has, so we wanted to ask if you would help us in promoting the service.


#### THE PRIORY ORGAN - WORK UNDERWAY

#### Diabetes and Sight Loss - Raising Awareness During Diabetes Week 20

Diabetes Week is an annual UK-wide initiative devoted to raising awareness of diabetes and funding research into the condition. Set up by British charity Diabetes UK, it runs from June 12 - 18 and 4Sight Vision Support (4SVS) will be lending its full support. The charity provides advice and specialist information to blind and sight impaired residents throughout West Sussex, and aims to raise awareness of how diabetes may directly affect sight, along with the importance of regular eye health checks.

Richard Deadman recently joined 4SVS as a Client Engagement Officer and has first-hand experience of the link between diabetes and sight loss. Richard was diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes at the age of 4 and aged 27 woke up one morning completely blind. This was due to complications which caused both of his retinas to detach due to Diabetic Retinopathy caused by a high blood sugar level damaging the back of the eye. Doctors told Richard that this was due to mismanagement of the disease during his teenage years.

Thankfully after numerous operations, surgeons managed to save the sight in one eye but he remains totally blind in the other.

Richard is passionate about raising awareness: he comments "For people living with diabetes, especially youngsters, it is so important to make the right choices and listen to specialists to manage the condition correctly to reduce risks. And of course I advise everyone to attend regular sight checks to ensure good eye health."
