

Keeping a Festival



There is a history of music festivals in Boxgrove Priory. In The mid-twentieth century there were festivals under the auspices of Imogen Holst, daughter of Gustav, the composer of

'The Planets' and an important figure in the establishment of a certain kind of 'British or English' music with roots in folk song. He was the best friend of Ralph Vaughan Williams.

After those festivals, there seem to have been sporadic festivals of church music, involving local church choirs.

And, because of its excellent acoustics, Boxgrove Priory has also provided a venue for instrumental music, including the 'Music at Boxgrove' Series.

But, because monks knew a thing or two about acoustics, their buildings are extraordinarily good for the human singing voice, and the sound of their gregorian chant must have sounded glorious at Boxgrove.

In our present day we, at Boxgrove Priory, are blessed by a choir that sings, beautifully, music from a range of times and countries. At Boxgrove, the backbone of what we do tends to be gregorian chant and renaissance polyphony, but there is also much that is contemporary, and from a variety various other styles and periods.

We are about to hold our Choral Festival, under the direction of Joseph Wicks, and will be pleased to welcome back the Gesualdo Six and the Beaufort Singers, and to include in this year's programme, Richard Strauss's 'The Four Last Songs' performed b Katherine Gregory and Madeleine Brown. Other highlights will be the Rachmaninove Vespers, by candlelight, on the Saturday night (2nd September) - and the Mass setting by Poulenc, at the 11am Sunday morning.Solemn Mass. These things will bring joy because they represent the gifts of God to us in music, and, as always, we take this thing and learn the skills associated with listening and performing, and make festival by offering them to him.

Do come and be part of this fabulous Festival. I guarantee that it will enrich your life.

The Neighbourhood Plan team are currently updating our policies and will soon be having a mandatory 'Call for Sites' before starting the assessment process of identifying where our allocation can best be built.

This will be based on a professional assessment and public consultation.

Our allocation is 50 dwellings; however, the Chichester Local Plan is far from completed and this number could well change. We have contested this number for many reasons, and these are outlined in the last update. Our plan needs to dovetail with Chichester's so we can only progress as fast as they do.

There are many sites in the parish identified as being potentially 'developable' and currently three of these are being actively pursued by the developers.

Each of these have been informed of the above situation and that their sites will be assessed in due course as part of our NP preparation. None of these are in accordance with our 'made' Neighbourhood Plan.

Many of you will now have received the unofficial 'consultation' from **SP Broadway** about the site which they insist on, incorrectly, calling 'land NW of 56 Stane St', otherwise known as **Rohan Stables**, which is on the A285 opposite Tinwood Lane.

This only gives a broad outline of what they propose and therefore lacks any real detail that can be used to assess the site or make comparisons with any others that are proposed.

Residents are obviously free to make whatever comments they wish, but at this stage our recommendation is to ignore it and wait until we see the details of a proper planning application.

At that stage a public consultation will take place.

'Unofficial' comments made to SP Broadway at this stage could be used by their barristers, at any subsequent appeal, to our detriment.


We will, ultimately, need to choose a site otherwise the choice will be made for us.

National Eye Health Week Checks Highlights Importance of Regular Eye Heath Checks

This September, 4Sight Vision Support (4SVS) will once again be lending its support to National Eye Health Week (NEHW). This nationwide awareness week will be held from 18 - 24 September and promotes the importance of good eye health and the need for regular eye health checks for all.

Sight is the sense people fear losing the most, yet many of us don't know how to look after our eyes - National Eye Health Week aims to change all that! Two million people in the UK are living with sight loss that is severe enough to have a significant impact on their daily lives, yet half of this sight loss is avoidable.

Regular eye health checks can detect early signs of conditions, including glaucoma, which can be treated if found soon enough. In addition, during an eye health check, other health conditions such as diabetes or high blood pressure may be detected. Those living with sight loss should continue to do so as checking for further changes in the eyes can help make the best use of remaining vision and prevent any unnecessary further sight loss. 4SVS will be raising awareness with a focus on prevention and the importance of getting things checked out.

In the run up to NEHW, 4Sight Vision Support, in partnership with Blind Veterans UK, is hosting a Sight Loss Awareness Day in Chichester on Tuesday 12 th September. This drop-in event is free and is open to anyone of any age living with sight loss, their friends, families and carers, and presents an opportunity to find out more about the practical help and support that is available to those affected. It is being held at the Jubilee Hall, New Park Community Centre, Chichester from 1 - 3pm, refreshments are included.

Jennnifer Hancock- Property Acquisitions Negotiating a lower price -how low do you go?



'Do you think I can secure the house under the asking price, and how low can I go?' are two of the most popular questions I am asked as a buying agent. During the market frenzy of Covid, securing a home for under the asking price was pretty much an impossible task. This was especially true for the good quality houses in the sought after locations, as the race for space meant demand far outweighed supply. However, with mortgage rates rising since the Mini Budget last Autumn, the tide has most definitely turned now, putting the balance of power in favour of buyers and haggling on price a little more possible.

What we're seeing at the moment is that the difference between buyer and seller expectations has been steadily growing throughout this year. There is a price correction between the property market peak of 2021 and now. Many sellers believe they're still in the market of 2022, whilst buyers are thinking more 2020/21, mainly fuelled by the pressures of increased mortgage rates and general cost of living. Purchasers are definitely more wary now as a result, and if they feel anything is wrong with the location or house itself, they want to haggle on price.

According to Hamptons, one of the UK's largest estate agents, 54% of homes across England & Wales sold below their asking price in July, up from 47% in June and 34% in July last year. Price reductions have also reached their highest level in at least nine years, with buyers achieving a 4.5% discount average last month. We are seeing similar trends, as sellers realise that if they want to sell quickly, they need to be realistic about what is happening in the current market.

Currently, we are securing properties for buyers at guide price or slightly under, which wouldn't have happened even a year ago. This is because demand in and around the waterside and rural villages of Chichester, Midhurst and Petworth is still as strong as it has been, whilst good quality houses are scarce.

So how can you maximise your chances of having a lower offer accepted?

It's important to remember that a house is only worth what somebody is prepared to pay for it. Just because it's been set at a particular asking price does not mean that that is the correct value. There are a number of factors to consider when making an offer, which takes into consideration things like the seller's circumstances, location and if there are major works that need doing. With this knowledge, buyers can then make an offer – whether at guide or below it. Go too low however, and you risk losing out entirely, which is where the benefit of having a buying agent on side plays a vital role.

Our tips include putting the offer in its best light and explaining the circumstances. If you are a cash buyer for example, you are in a very good position in the current market. Vendors, particularly those who need to sell quickly, are choosing the buyer who has the ability to purchase over who is offering the highest price. This is because with funds ready in the bank, cash buyers can move forwards quickly and there is less risk of the sale falling through. Another good factor to include is if you are happy to be flexible on a completion date. Exchange can happen as soon as you can, but a long completion date can give a seller more time to find something else. This also then makes them a proceedable buyer, putting them in good stead for their onward purchase.

What is the first question any individual should ask before instructing a legal professional? The instant answer of "how much" may spring to mind, however have you considered instead asking "are you regulated?"

It sounds strange that this should even be an issue, however with emerging technology, internet wills and dare I say W.H.Smith Wills, the question is ever more important.

Certain categories of legal services such as Will writing do not require compulsory regulation, which is a bone of contention for me. This means <u>anyone</u> can draft a Will. After six years of training before I even set foot in a law firm and a further two years training before I was considered knowledgeable enough to provide any advice, I find it difficult to fathom that this level of advice could be provided without the appropriate legal training.

The crux of the matter is anyone can provide this advice and there is no set regulatory body to regulate all individuals providing this advice. You can be confident that all Solicitors are Regulated by the Solicitors Regulation Authority and Legal Executives by the Chartered Institute of Legal Executives. This provides protection to consumers, as ongoing legal training is required and part of the membership covers legal indemnity insurance, in case things go wrong.


Some Will writers do join regulatory bodies, however there is a large percentage who do not. It can therefore be a minefield for consumers to try to navigate, which is why a recent BBC article on this issue was most welcome. This article highlighted the issues faced and announced that the Competition and Markets Authority (CMA) is investigating some Will writing services where individuals were being pressured into signing up for Will-writing services and provided with substandard advice.

In my mind any articles that highlight this issue to the wider public is positive for the legal profession, however it is frustrating that despite over a decade of calls to regulate the industry, the government has rejected the need for regulation on more than one occasion.

So what does this mean? Simply put - just be careful. Check whether the legal advisor is licenced and regulated. If you do not choose the classic route of a Solicitor or Legal Executive and instead opt for a professional Will writer, then check that they are a member of a recognised organisation such as the Institute of Professional Will writers or the Society of Will Writers.

It may be cheaper to use the services of an unregulated individual, but is it worth the risk?

This Month's Recipe

Cheese and Tomato Quiche

Shortcrust pastry:

300g plain flour 150g unsalted butter, 60 ml, cold water 10 ml lemon juice 1 teaspoon of salt

Blitz flour and butter until they resemble fine breadcrumbs.

Add-in the remaining ingredients and bring together.

Tip out, form a ball, wrapp in clingfilm and rest it in the fridge for half an hour. Once rested, roll out and line a 30 cm tin.

Fill with parchment paper and baking beans and blind bake at 180° c (or 160° c for a fan oven).

Cook for 20 minutes, take out beans and parchment and cook for another 5 to 10 minutes, until light and slightly golden.

Once cooked, brush with egg and return to the oven for five minutes. This will seal it and keep it crisp.

Filling:

Five large free range eggs. 200 ml of double cream 100 ml of milk 1 teaspoon of salt.
