



Boxgrove Neighbourhood Plan Update

Housing at Rohan Stables Halnaker

The application was on the agenda of the August meeting of the CDC Planning Committee. It was recommended for approval by the officers, but the councillors agreed to defer to see if agreement could be reached to reduce the number of dwellings. This is likely to be back on the agenda in September.

Battery and Energy Storage System (ESS) Boxgrove Common

Planning permission has still not been granted by WSCC to change the approved restoration plan. The landowner's proposal is to reduce the woodland area to make it possible to apply for planning permission for the Battery Storage and Electrical Substation.

This 'industrial facility' up to 7m high in the restored quarry would be adjacent to the Tinwood Lane right of way. It would produce noise from cooling fans and electrical devices as well as impacting on the landscape.

The 'Folly' Housing Development A285 Halnaker

This proposed development of nine houses is now the subject of a preliminary planning application. This will be subject to further public consultation shortly.

Boxgrove Housing Allocation by CDC

The Neighbourhood Plan contested our allocation of 50 dwellings during the initial consultation of CDC's Local Plan. This is now at the examination stage, so we have initiated a survey to test residents' views about the reasonableness of this number.

New Dementia Sensory Garden Opened by Tangmere Charity

Sage House in Tangmere has created a brand-new sensory garden to give people living with dementia the opportunity to benefit from being outdoors, participating in gardening, and sensory stimulation. Sage House is a unique dementia hub - the first of its kind in the UK, providing a full range of dementia services under one roof.

Taking pride of place at the front of the hub, the charity has transformed an unused area - full of scruffy shrubs affected by blight, - into an accessible and colourful sensory garden. The endeavour was led by Sage House Services Manager, Simon James, Wayfinder Natasha Davies and a volunteer garden committee. The garden has been designed as an accessible space for everyone to appreciate and enjoy. The paths have been created to be wheelchair accessible, enabling access to every area, and the raised beds enable people to garden without bending down.

The garden will be maintained by attendees at the charity's Day Breaks and activity sessions - helping to keep them active. Carers can also benefit from the garden as a quiet and safe space for reflection outdoors, as well as somewhere to remember loved ones who they have lost to dementia.



The new sensory garden was unveiled in an event held on Thursday 8th August, and declared open by the Chichester Town Crier and former Mayor of Chichester, Richard Plowman. Thirty people attended the event and enjoyed a tour of the garden's many donated plants. Guests included parish, district and county councillors, businesses that donated services or products for the garden, volunteers who have supported the effort, and charity Trustees and Vice-Presidents.

The honour of the ribbon-cutting was granted to Sage House customer Jim, who lives with dementia and has a passion for gardening. Jim is one of the first customers to feel the huge wellbeing benefits that the therapeutic sensory garden will undoubtedly bring to local people living with dementia.

The project was funded by the Worshipful Company of Gardeners and Chichester District Council, with materials and/or services kindly provided by Knights Fencing, SCS Waste, Brick Kiln, Geoff's Garden Ornaments and the Woodhorn Group. This beautiful new garden wouldn't have been possible without the all the volunteers and donors who have generously supported the project and helped bring it to life.

Emma Radley, Chief Operations Officer said: "This garden will provide an exciting new opportunity for us to engage our customers in meaningful activities. We recognise the many benefits that gardening brings and want to support our customers to enjoy gardening in a safe way. Alongside our full range of services, this is another way for us to provide excellent care for people with dementia and for them to connect with the natural world."

NEWS FROM THE BOXGROVE BELLES

July was the month for 'outings' for The Belles. Our official meeting was held at Selhurst Park. Just driving up the long drive was a revelation, with numerous farm buildings on the left and acres of vines on the right. A brown hare very obligingly scampered up the path ahead of us before nipping under some wire and disappearing off into the distance. We were welcomed by the owner, Sarah Green, who told us that she and one full-time gardener manage the gardens between them. - and that is a lot of garden!

The huge walled garden where we first entered is largely lawn, where croquet is played, with beautiful borders full of roses, hydrangeas, cranesbill geraniums, penstemons, rudbeckia, and other wonderful summer flowers. Beyond the walled garden was an enviable vegetable garden - so well organised and weed free! Another garden surrounded the swimming pool. The architectural plants and cool greens made this a lovely spot on a hot day. Borders of lavenders led back to the walled garden and from there we could make our way to yet another garden where the large pond and fountain could be found. It was a very pleasant way to spend an afternoon and the home-made cakes and tea were a welcome addition.

Our next Outing was a trip on the Chichester Canal Basin. It was another great day out. We saw cygnets (albeit quite grown up but still in their grey feathers), and young coots chasing after their mother, along with lots of mallard ducks. Sadly, no kingfishers or herons. But there were a lot of dragonflies and damselflies whizzing about. The sides of the canal were full of bullrushes and reed mace along with swathes of yellow and mauve wild flowers whose names we couldn't remember! The crew were great fun - full of information and funny stories. The chatter and laughter said it all, so it was just as well we had booked the whole boat for ourselves.

We're back to our normal meetings in September when we shall meet at the St Blaise Centre at 2.15 pm on Wednesday, 11th September, to learn about 'Strength, Balance and Exercise' from Helen Rothwell.

National Eye Health Week Highlights Importance of Regular Eye Health Checks


From 23rd – 29th September 2024 it's National Eye Health Week, and 4Sight Vision Support (4SVS) is proud to support this initiative which encourages people to look after their eyes and have regular eye health checks. This year, the theme is 'Vision Really Matters', and 4SVS will be raising awareness and providing information about accessing eye health checks and promoting good eye health in our daily lives.

Regular eye health checks can detect early signs of conditions, including glaucoma, which can be treated if found soon enough. In addition, during an eye health check, other health conditions such as diabetes or high blood pressure may be detected. Those living with sight loss should continue to do so as checking for further changes in the eyes can help make the best use of remaining vision and prevent any unnecessary further sight loss.



The Optimistic Gardener

Busy as a bee

How doth the little busy bee Improve each shining hour, And gather honey all the day From every opening flower!"

And how doth the (little) busy Optimistic Gardener fill each 'shining hour'?

Summer in the Reeves' household is mostly taken up with Picking, Watering and Bee Bothering. And this year is no exception.

The year started with three hives of bees; in order to record work I have done on each colony I give them names. It started years ago with royal names for the queens - Victoria, Elizabeth, Mary etc etc but I very soon ran out of queens. Once I'd been through the more obscure ones - Matilda, Camilla, Boudicca (rather a feisty colony) I changed to names linked to the Queen's parentage. I bought in a replacement queen for a very aggressive colony which was a breed of Buckfast queen. These queens produce bees which are very gentle and productive in their first year so it was, as they say, a no-brainer!

However, what I didn't realise at the time was that each successive generation of queens from this parentage become less placid - and this year I have reached a 4th generation of my first Buckfast queen. In the first year the hive was just (rather boringly) called Buckfast. She produced a lot of bees and a lot of honey but early in in her second year she decided that she needed to upsize - the accommodation I had given her was more 'hunting lodge' and less 'palace'. Fortunately she had planned the move by laying the next generation of queens and the bees chose the one they wanted and 'dispensed' with the rest (red in tooth and claw).



When she took off (swarmed) with half of her 'ladies-in-waiting' she left her successor who was young and, after several mating flights, was ready to produce the next generation of worker bees. When I was able to spot her - now much bigger than her fellow workers - I crowned her with a coloured dot.

The reason for doing this is twofold. Firstly it makes the queen easy to spot when you need to find her to carry out some manipulation of the hive. As you can see from the photo she is far larger and has a different body shape to her daughters. She also moves about the frame very differently to her gals. But if she isn't marked with her royal blue livery she is almost impossible to find in a full Summer-strength hive of 50,000 bees.

Secondly the colour spot indicates which year she was born.

If the queen emerged in a year ending with a I or a 6 she is painted with a white spot (Gerry used to use Tippex to do this but I have splashed out on 5 different colours of water-based Posca pens - he really is such a cheapskate!). If the year ends with 2 or 7 then Yellow is the colour of choice etc etc. There is a very useful mnemonic to remember the order of the colours: Will You Raise Good Bees (white, yellow, red, green and blue).



So last year (2023) the colour which everyone was wearing was red; consequently my new queen became Redbuck. Still quite amiable bees but not the sort you want to handle without wearing a veil.

In the same year my new queen, like her mum, decided that the residence I had provided for her was simply not palatial enough so she disappeared over the horizon leaving generation number 3 of queens. When the battle for succession had taken place my new queen was christened NewRedbuck and she too had a red spot and bees which were slightly more grumpy.

By this year (if you have been paying attention you will be able to work out that this year's colour is green) the fourth generation queen was now called Greenbuck IV and I decided that enough is enough. It seems to me that since the queens mate with drones with no pedigree, their offspring haven't got the genes which create a calm queen. The final straw came when I was happily minding my own business in the fruit cage tying in some loganberries when I was targeted by a murderous psychopath from this colony who stung me above the eye. Even with a long session with a bag of frozen peas cradled against my face and an antihistamine tablet, the right hand-side of my face swelled up; I could barely open my right eye and I could have auditioned for the Phantom of the Opera!

So I have spent the second half of the summer trying to replace Queen Greenbuck IV with a newly bought-in queen. She arrived with me courtesy of the Royal Mail (naturally) and I proceeded to introduce her to the colony once I had removed the old green queen. You really don't want to know how I did this!

However a week later the queen should have been accepted by her new entourage and I should have found her eggs. When I opened up the colony I optimistically

thought it had worked. The bees didn't rush out to greet me with that instantly recognisable angry buzz but pottered around on their frames minding their own

business. They were quite happy for me to draw out the frames, one-by-one and look carefully for eggs the size of a grain of sand. But try as I might there was no signs of a laying queen - no larvae, no eggs, not even a sign of polished cells being cleared out for their new monarch to lay in. And certainly **no queen.**

And yet since that day the bees in that colony have been meek and mild and we haven't been strafed by any of them as we approach the hive which is rather too close for comfort to the hen-house. So what has happened?

Why are the British people obsessed with home ownership and will Generation Z continue this trend?



It is a very British characteristic to obsess about being a homeowner. European countries do not understand the fascination we have with our homes being our castles.

Generation Z faces the biggest gap of any generation between housing aspiration and reality, but the majority still want to buy. Putting affordability to one side, 81% of Generation Z would choose to buy a home if they could, compared to 93% of Millennials, according to Beresford research.

Reasons underlying our apparent fixations stem from three principal factors, which are historic, financial and social. Owning your own home has implied wealth for years, however large or small your home. Not living in someone else's house can provide a feeling of achievement and success, doing what you would like to in your own home with financial security.

For many years we have always looked at the profit we make from property, knowing this will happen and earn us money when we come to selling. Since the millennium, some prices have trebled, so house owners have looked at this as another way to grow wealth that can sometimes be more than their year's salary.

How will this change as we enter a Labour controlled government, with the possibility of more taxes on the property sector and the continued reduction in the number of private landlords? As the rental sector changes, the effect on Generation Z will be significant.

With no short term financial benefit or gain and no asset giving help for the longer


term in the rental sector, buying a home, however hard it may seem, still could be the way forward.

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
