At the end of term our Bronze PE Ambassadors - Oscar Brackenbury, Grace Budd, Tom Dunster, Joshua Harris, Angela Hill, Eric Lee, Phoebe Slade and Lyra Wood - organised a circuit of interhouse events to highlight good sportsmanship qualities - ie via a sport quiz, team games and a talent show. Each activity had been well thought out and organised. The interhouse class talent show was amazing. The children are very talented! We saw some football and roller-blading skills and trophies, dances, guitar playing, gymnastic displays, lego builds, balance tricks, drawings, singing acts, poem recitals - a whole array of different things. Lacey-May demonstrated her hoolahooping skills and then tried to teach me - at one point the hoola-hoop went flying across the Community Room: I was not "a natural"!

In the afternoon, Mr O'Connor (Area Sports Games Organiser) and his sport leaders from The Regis School in Bognor Regis came, having devised an assortment of PE activities - eg wheelchair fencing, tag rugby, parachute games, tri golf - for our children to participate in, to support them further in their understanding of what it means to be a Rights Respecting School. Every child who took part was given a certificate: some children were awarded individual certificates for demonstrating a RRS value, and there was a winning team who showed the values the most at each sporting station. It was a fantastic day!

And then on the last day, the children enjoyed a "fun filled" day. It began with house team Easter activities: our Easter service at Boxgrove Priory; we then enjoyed an Easter themed picnic lunch, followed by Malcolm the Magician's show and ending with an exciting PTFA egg hunt - and of course the chance to eat a yummy cake at the PTFA cake sale and cuppa!

Boxgrove Neighbourhood Plan Update April 2019

Since the last update we have now received a long awaited response from our MP Mrs Keegan and more information about the habitats regulation that has been holding up the examination of our plan.

Unfortunately, our MP's reply did not give any new information or hope of a quicker resolution but was very apologetic about the time taken to respond and sympathy with our plight. The full reply can be seen on the NP website.

Chichester DC have now completed their screening about the impact of development in Boxgrove on the flight of bats using the Singleton and Cocking disused railway tunnels. They have concluded that there is sufficient mitigation in our plan from the policy included about the protection of trees and hedgerows. Unfortunately, this statement now has to go out for consultation with the

consequential further delay and potential need for a full assessment should there be an objection. The screening document can be found on our website.

There is a potential positive advantage to this though, in that the presence of bats in the parish could thwart any unwelcome development in the future. Perhaps we should instigate a batwatch?

BOXGROVE PARISH COUNCIL Report from the Parish Council, April 2019

Thankfully the 55 Bus service through Halnaker and Boxgrove was on schedule and is now back to normal. Quite unnecessarily interrupted but I'm afraid that's bureaucracy! Left and right hands out of touch with each other! Sadly there may be more disruption to the A285 when Southern Water (this time) bring the 'Trans Chichester Waste Water Pipeline' from Whitehouse Farm, west of Parklands in Chichester, all the way across to the recently extended (capacity wise) Easthampnett Waste Water Treatment Works, east of Tangmere. I'm unsure of the precise date when this will happen, but no doubt it may require a further road closure.

The housing developments at the southern end of Boxgove are now well under way, and the Parish Council are in receipt of quite a substantial sum of money, by way of the Community Infrastructure Levy, paid by the developer, which is welcome. Our Clerk, Imogen, and I recently attended a CIL workshop promoted by CDC to better understand how and where these monies may be spent. There will be much discussion at forthcoming Parish Council Meetings.

The final date for nominations for Parish Council members passed on Thursday 4th April and I'm pleased to say that Boxgrove PC is now at full strength of 9 Councillors without the need of an election. I welcome the addition of Cllr Malcolm Simpson and Cllr Rob Etherington to the existing members whom we are all familiar with.

We have all heard that the future of the Village Store and Cafe now appears to be secure and further details will emerge over the coming weeks.

The Sports Pavilion extension works are almost complete: as I write this a large area of decking is being laid to cover the foundation and the playing field has been close mown ready for the cricket season, and the 'hallowed' square is receiving the needed attention. It's all looking good!

The Optimistic Gardener

Plants for the Memories

Some people, like my sister, are really keen on keeping and organising their photographs to remember their friends and family events. Even in this day and age of digital photos she still chooses a selection to print off and put in a photograph album. Well she has more time than I do!

Others keep diaries for the same purpose. Gerry does this in order to help him remember when things have happened - time whizzes by so quickly.

I find a walk round the garden brings my friends and family back to me through tending the plants they have given to me over the years. It also reminds me of certain events which have happened to create the garden which I have today.

When we first moved to High Trees I brought with me some small saplings which I had grown back in Worthing in 1987. Now I don't know whether you are too young to remember that year, but mention the name Michael Fish and everyone will know what I am talking about! After the Great Storm on I3 October 1987 our road in Worthing was covered in fallen trees and the council set up various sites around the town for people to bring their timber for burning.



Gerry had taken some branches from our fallen silver birch to one such site and returned with a present for me - an enormous cone he had picked up off the ground. As the time passed the cone opened up and disgorged its seeds. It seemed like a good idea to try and sow them, so I ended up with about 20 little pots of pine saplings which moved with us from Worthing to Barnham in June 1988.



Fortunately I only planted one of these saplings in our new garden, since they turned out to be a tree called *Pinus radiata* - the Monterey Pine. According to Wikipedia it is the most widely planted pine in the world and is valued for its rapid growth and desirable lumber and pulp qualities! We put our Christmas tree lights on it in its first full year of growth; in the second year we needed two sets of lights and thereafter we were unable to keep up with it. This is now the tallest tree in our garden and plays host to a number of birds' nests. It also has a bird box and an owl box in its branches. But if we have another storm like that of 1987 I think I know which will be the first tree to go over!

Another plant which I hold dear is the Acer Negundo - Flamingo, a variegated box elder which was given to us as a leaving present by a family at the school we both used to work at in Storrington. This is the same family who gave us a loo roll for our Paper wedding anniversary (number I)! It is the tree which we look at virtually every day, as it grows quite near to the house and holds the various squirrel-proof bird feeders with which we feed the birds. It has reverted to its green parent which is a much more vigorous strain than the variegated version, and so



consequently has to be kept in check and now sports a stylish haircut virtually every other year.

Acers are very prone to honey fungus - apart from Acer Negundo - and they prefer acid soil. So any other acers in our garden have to go into pots. I have one particular favourite - not for its wondrous autumn colour (which of course it has); not for the amazing shapes of its leaves (see photo); but because I grew the tree from a seed collected from Wisley by our old next-door neighbour who is no longer with us but I'm sure is tending a celestial allotment somewhere.

As I walk around the garden I have the opportunity to remember lots of friends. There is one in particular who is a very keen gardener and he has provided me with plants I wouldn't have dreamed of buying - the Japanese Angelica tree (Aralia elata), winter-flowering honeysuckle (Lonicera fragrantissima), Star magnolia (Magnolia stellata), Star jasmine (Trachelospermum jasminoides), variegated ground elder (Aegopodium podagraria). Yes! You didn't misread it! Ground elder - some friend! But actually this plant is confined to a pot and makes a very good indicator for when my pots need watering - it droops dramatically but always comes back after a long drink. I make sure that the flowers never get the opportunity to turn into seeds and after fifteen or so years I have never had one escape! I can't remember changing the soil in the pot either!

Some friends are great gardeners and have interesting plants to share. One friend has moved from a large garden to a much smaller one and tried to bring her favourite plants with her but realised she had to give her charges some elbow room, so from her I have fostered an amazing <u>cardoon</u>, whose flower stems grow to about ten feet high; I have a shrub - chaste tree (*Vitex agnus-castus*) which has late summer lavender flowers and is very attractive to bees (its common name comes from its use as an anaphrodisiac in monasteries!); and most prized of all her cast-offs is *Salvia amistad*, a towering salvia which reaches 4 feet in the summer.

Some friends don't quite have my taste in plants but I have never knowingly refused a garden gift so have ended up with a *griselinia* which is often used by flower arrangers; but this particular large shrub would provide the whole of the Boxgrove Flower Festival with foliage and still have some left over. I have water mint 'kindly' given to me which rampages through the edges of the pond. And another friend who would often pass on plants which hadn't sold at trade fairs - unfortunately they were exotics which look quite out of place in a country garden.

So while some people pour over their photographs and others spend hours on Facebook, my friends pay me a visit every time I walk round the garden.

Boxgrove and Halnaker Traffic Calming Group Update

Each spring for the last two years the **Traffic Calming Group** members and other volunteers have spent a few days doing some spring clean-up work in Halnaker and Boxgrove. How a village or town looks and the pride the residents show for their homes has been proven to have an impact on driver behaviour. Pride of Place makes a difference.

This year the group will be conducting the **spring clean-up work on May 9**th **and 10**th; so look out for the teams in their yellow jackets. We will be jet washing the signs and the bus shelters, washing the village gates, pulling up weeds and trimming back overgrown vegetation, and anything else we can think of to tidy up after winter. It's fun and friendly!

If you would like to join us, please meet us each day outside the village shop at 9:30am. Bring your gloves, your hand tools and a yellow jacket if you have one (if not, we can find one for you). You may have a hour to spare, or maybe a whole day. If this is not for you, take a look at your own front yard and give it a spruce up this spring.

On a different subject, the **Community Speed Watch** Teams have been out and about again this year. Since we started in 2017, we have reported 2460 vehicles for exceeding 35mph in Boxgrove or Halnaker and each of the drivers has been contacted by the Police. This activity, along with the regular deployment of the Speed Indicator Device (SID) on fixed posts around the two villages, is contributing to driver education about their speeds and the results show some improvement, but there is still more to do. If you would like to join the speed watch team just ask one of the members by the side of the road. An hour or two a month to spare? You can make a difference.

Also watch out for the new SID in early May with its brighter display.




