BOXGROVE & HALNAKER TRAFFIC CALMING GROUP UPDATE

Community Highway Schemes - The Halnaker Community Highway Scheme has now been submitted to West Sussex Highways for consideration after approval by the Parish Council. If the scheme makes it through this phase of WSCC review, the scheme will go head to head with other schemes across the county for funding in October. We will keep you updated on progress. The document can be accessed via the Parish Council website, at https://boxgrovepc.org/images/PDF/community/ Halnaker CHS final june 7 master res70-2.pdf.

The Boxgrove scheme is now approved/funded and WSCC Highways Engineers have started their feasibility work. We will be meeting with WSCC to discuss their solutions later this year ahead of implementation next year. More to follow on this after the summer.

Boxgrove School safety Zone - WSCC Highways have confirmed the School 20mph safety zone will be implemented this financial year and they are hopeful it will be in place for the start of the autumn term. Drivers will be required to pass the School at max 20mph when the lights are flashing.

Thank you Goodwood - After making Goodwood Estate aware of a vehicle involved in the build-up for the Festival of Speed speeding through Boxgrove at 45mph, the Goodwood team have issued an estate wide communication and put temporary speed signs in Boxgrove. Thank you Goodwood.

Community Speed Watch - Over 170 vehicles were reported to the Police for exceeding 35mph in Boxgrove and Halnaker during speed watch sessions last month. Over 2800 vehicles have been reported since we started. Maximum speed recorded and reported is 68mph in the 30mph limit in Halnaker.

New Speed Indicator Device -The new SID is up and running with its bright new orange display. Look out for it around Boxgrove and Halnaker. The device logs all vehicle speeds and this data helps us make our case for action to WSCC Highways.

Village Fete - Come and see us at the village fete. Try your hand at the 'follow the wire' game and win a prize or take your selfie with the speed dummies who will be out supporting us.

Halnaker Drop Kerb - Thank you to LandBuild Ltd for installing at no cost a much needed drop kerb opposite the Anglesey Arms as a community initiative. This will make crossing the road at this point on this busy A road that much safer.

Did you know? Around two-thirds of crashes in which people are killed or injured occur on roads with a speed limit of 30 mph or less.

BOXGROVE PARISH COUNCIL

Report from the Parish Council, May & June 2019



The Parish Council met on 13 June, its Annual Meeting. Officers were elected, and Cllr Potter remains as Chairman and Cllr Addison as Vice Chairman. Other appointments were agreed and these can be found in the minutes of the June Meeting - too numerous to list here.

I'm pleased to say that agreement has been reached between the Cricket and Football Clubs and a new Boxgrove Sports Club has been constituted. The PC can now offer and grant a new lease of The Pavilion together with the proposed extension, the groundwork of which has been completed, to the Club. There seems to be considerable ignorance of what has been achieved here.

When the Pavilion suffered winter damage, it was decided that it was in need of improvement. An extension was requested by members of the Sports community and discussion began and plans drawn for a not inconsiderable extension. Funding was forthcoming from various sources - CDC, The Solar Farm at Strettington, and a grant from Inert recycling who are backfilling the Quarry. Much of this money was specifically for Sports facilities and had timing as to when it had to be spent, and so the PC decided to go ahead with the foundation works. Now additional funding must be sought to complete the above ground work. All of this was discussed at PC meetings over the past year or so, and I feel unfair criticism of the actions of the PC is completely unfounded!

We are pleased to welcome Mr Craig Ramus, the new proprietor of the Village Stores and tea room. My early impression is that it should do well, and the additional hours of operation will be appreciated. Let's use it!

A speeding vehicle through Boxgrove recently, carrying lots of stickers clearly linking it to the build up of the Festival of Speed, was reported not only to the Police, but to the event management team at Goodwood via Cllr Lloyd Tooze, the PC representative on Goodwood matters. The very next day we were blessed with Max Speed 30mph signs placed in The Street and a apology from Goodwood. So, well done the Speed Watch Team and Lloyd.

The annual Village clean up days were well supported by volunteers, and a great deal was achieved - particularly to the footpath on the north side of Stane Street. About half a metre of footpath was recovered from overgrowth of hedging and weeds - quite remarkable! Litter-picking also took place in Tinwood Lane. We must thank these volunteers - it was quite hard physical work.

Finally, meetings and dialogue are ongoing with parents and children regarding fresh equipment for the Children's Play Area. The recent Safety Assessment carried out by Wicksteads showed there was nothing requiring immediate attention: comments about the safety surfaces were evident but these can be addressed as and when new equipment is agreed. I hope this enthusiasm continues: it is encouraging.

THE OPTIMISTIC GARDENER

The Optimistic Gardener Foraging from the Wild

Everyone likes to get a free gift: do you remember when you used to get small plastic figures in your cereal packets, or were able to buy a plate for 10p from Keymarkets when you spent over £20 on your shopping? I still have several of those plates; they are indestructible. I even donated some to a plate smashing stall at our school fête and had them returned!

Well, nature is very generous and is laden with free gifts if you know where to look. It also helps if you have the foraging mentality. As I've mentioned in the past, I am my mother's daughter (of course you are!) and she couldn't pass a blackberry patch without pausing to fill her plastic bag with its bounty. She was in her element one year when we camped in a Scottish field which provided us with field mushrooms for breakfast each morning.

I have inherited much from my mother (not all good) and this foraging gene is particularly strong in me. For the Reeves' household the year is divided into Food for Free seasons, rather than months.

There is the first season of the Reeves' year - the Dandelion (*Taraxacum officinale*) season. Many people exert a lot of energy grubbing out the dandelions from their lawns. They don't appreciate that they have the main ingredient of a superior sparkling wine on their compost heap. Every 23rd April (St George's Day) my parents used to drag us out



picking off dandelion heads until we had enough for a brew. 'What was the reason for it being 23rd April?', I hear you call. Well, on this day the dandelions are at their best -

many are in flower and few have turned into dandelion clocks.



The next season is with us at present - the Elderflower season. There are lots of things you can do with elderflowers (Sambucus nigra) and many of them involve making a cordial to start with. This does require a little bit of time and patience, but once made, unlike *elderflower wine, you can drink it straight away. This is such a quintessential taste of summer that I make pints of it each year and freeze it in pint milk cartons. Be warned! When it is frozen it does look remarkably like frozen milk, so I tie a little strip of ribbon (foraged from left-over wedding orders-of-service at Boxgrove!) to each handle; adding a dash of elderflower cordial to your cup of tea can prove to be very disappointing.

Once we are into summer, the Reeves' seasons come thick and fast. We range the hedgerows for blackberries and damsons (Prunus domestica) and the freezer begins to fill up nicely. There is one place where we can pretty well guarantee a damson crop on the August Bank Holiday weekend, but I have to keep this location a well-guarded secret. As they say in James Bond films, "If I told you I'd have to kill you!" Not only do damsons make the most delicious jam and jelly, but they also make a fine substitute for sloes in damson gin or damson brandy.

Sloes (Prunus Spinosa) are another crop worth foraging ... though don't do what I did and mistake them in the freezer for a bag of blackcurrants - they don't taste so good in a crumble! They do, however, make a wonderful liqueur in the form of sloe gin - and, even more gourmet, a sloe gin ice cream when the berries are drained off the liquid after steeping for a year or so. This does require a little determination, as I needed a cherry stoner to remove the hard kernels, but once done it made the tastiest softscoop ice cream I have ever eaten!



A fruit which is much harder to find locally is the bilberry (Vaccinium myrtillus). This close relation of the blueberry likes high ground in quite acidic soil and is much more common in the north and west of Britain. It is the next superfood, as it contains greater concentrations of antioxidants and phytochemicals (whatever they are!) than blueberries. Indeed bilberries are said to have been a favourite of RAF bomber crews in the last war as they thought they improved night vision. Although they also

put out that carrots were being used to improve the vision of the RAF in an attempt to conceal the fact that Britain had radar, so it could simple be Bilberry spin! Bilberries have been used for different eye treatments through the ages, as well as being used to treat chronic fatigue, gout, haemorrhoids, diabetes, UTIs and osteoarthritis. "Bring on the bilberry jam!" is what I say!

When summer morphs into autumn and thoughts turn to warmer jumpers, and soups for lunch instead of salads, that is the season for tramping though the woods armed with my mushroom basket and a copy of Mushrooms and other fungi of Great Britain, by Roger Phillips. Alternatively, I pack the thick leather gauntlets and Sainsbury's shopping bags and head off to Petworth Park to gather sweet chestnuts and possibly one or two walnuts. The squirrels always seem to get the hazelnuts before I do, otherwise they would also be on the menu.

There are many hedgerow ingredients which I have not mentioned - ramsons (wild garlic), fat hen (a passable spinach substitute), Alexander's, wild sorrel, goosegrass, and the fruits

of crabapples, rose hips and medlars. Some trendy London restaurants are even putting these on the menu and winning Michelin stars in the process. Well - the diners at these places are not getting their exercise at the green gym and really should know that the best things in life are free!

Janet's recipe for Elderflower cordial

Ingredients

I kg granulated sugar

1.7 litres water

2 large lemons

1.5 tablespoons white wine vinegar

24 large, freshly picked elderflowers

1.5 dessert spoons citric acid



- Dissolve the sugar in the water gently no need to boil, just heat until all the sugar is dissolved and allow to cool to blood temperature
- Add the rind and juice of 2 lemons, 1.5 tblsp white wine vinegar, 24 Elderflower heads
- Leave to steep for 48 hours, stirring twice daily
- Strain through a clean muslin or jelly bag
- Add 1.5 dessert spoons of citric acid and stir well to dissolve
- Bottle into sterilised bottles. Stand in a deep pan of cold water with a tea towel or newspaper under and between bottles. Bring to a simmer and maintain simmer for 20 minutes. Remove from heat and put tops on the bottles immediately. It will keep for at least a year if prepared as above; once opened, keep refrigerated.
- Alternatively, ignore the last instruction, put in pint milk cartons and freeze making sure to note the contents on the bottle!

Boxgrove - New 3-5 Year Plan

Boxgrove Parish Council is starting to put together its new 3 – 5 year plan.

So that this plan truly reflects the aspirations and wishes across the Boxgrove, Halnaker, Strettington and Crockerhill communities, the Council would like to know what residents would like to see in it. Any project could be included, from tea clubs to play areas, shops or facilities. The Council is looking for new ideas that will have a positive impact on the lives of the residents of the Parish and be of some benefit. There are many grants available from outside funding sources that could help to make these dreams a reality.

Parish Councils do not usually have funds that they can spend on these types of projects; however, Boxgrove Parish Council will be receiving some funding from Chichester District Council in mitigation of the development currently being built in Priors Acre. The sum of money will not be huge (c£40,000) and it will only be a one-off payment, but it could be ear-marked for a project which will serve the Parish. Please let the Council know what you think is important and where you would like to see the money spent.

Boxgrove Parish Council puts in requests annually to CDC and SDNP for contributions to projects that are on the go, or that shortly will be implemented. Currently, these projects include the Traffic Calming schemes for Boxgrove and Halnaker; the Windmill car-park project; a safer crossing point for primary school children in The Street; a new play area. This doesn't mean that the Parish will get the funding, just that it is prioritising these items when applying for grants.

Chris reported the results of the voting which took place at the National Annual Meeting in Bournemouth. The resolution for the Government to maintain rural bus services as well as semi rural services was carried - for 5,729, with 262 against, a 96% majority, and the second Resolution, to increase awareness of the importance of Cervical Screening of women, was carried with 5,785 in favour, and 194 against, a majority of 97%.

Our Speakers then spoke about the origins of some of our curious sayings. They had various articles to show how many of our sayings originated. Their talks are always informative as well as amusing, and we shall be welcoming them back at Christmas time for a 'Tudor Christmas', when they will be in costume.


We then paused for tea and cakes, provided this month by Liz Aldridge and Jill Dipple.

THE FUTURE OF BOXGROVE CRICKET CLUB

The history of cricket at Boxgrove is well known; indeed, the earliest recorded instance so far discovered of a game of cricket (or 'crecket') played by several named players took place in the churchyard at Boxgrove in 1622.



Today, we are a non-profit making, friendly Sunday and occasional Saturday side who play just a Jos Buttler 'six' away from the old church ruins, behind the Village Hall. We are a popular and well-regarded team amongst the community of cricket clubs that we play against, winning our fair share of games, and in our recent history we have won multiple Downland and Clymping cups.



Unfortunately, despite our team being competitive on the pitch, we're being left behind off it! We are lagging behind other local teams whose communities have managed to invest in their sporting facilities. With the multitude of other leisure activities vying for the attention of young people these days, and with the directive of Sport England and the England and Wales Cricket Board to invest in more grassroots and junior cricket, the set-up at Boxgrove is no longer fit for purpose. The pavilion, built in the 1980s, has been

dilapidated for some time, and as the 'hub' of the local sporting community needs bringing up to today's modern standards.

The recent investment, led by the Parish Council, to start the first phase of the new pavilion will ultimately lead to Boxgrove Cricket Club, together with the Football Club under the newly formed Sports Club, being able to develop further the exciting ideas that will hopefully move sport in the community forward. As a result of our affiliation with Sussex County Cricket Club we're looking at a number of new initiatives to reinvigorate this already well-established club. These include such things as 'All Stars' lunior Cricket and Women's Cricket and Softball.

This will naturally take time, and the first step towards this is to ensure the facilities that we have are up to standard. We're pleased to be on the road to making this happen but funding needs to be found to complete these works, which will be tough. But hopefully in partnership with the Parish Council, who will be exploring a number of different funding options, we will be able to fulfil our dreams and get the sporting facilities that this village needs



and deserves. In turn this brings further support in the form of players, supporters and officials, and will enable us to have every success in achieving our goals and being a Sports Club that the community can be proud of.


