From Father Ian

In the past year there has been a growing sense of paralysis within both the political and social life of the UK.

The difficulties with the Brexit process have been making themselves felt in all kinds of ways, and not just in this country but throughout Europe. Many unpleasant things which were tamed by good manners, courtesy, and the general sense of wanting to be where others were in the political dialogue, have been laid bare.



In the UK, the level of xenophobia and of aggression now often shown towards people from other countries, or even UK citizens who are not white Caucasian, is both shameful and alarming. Combining these toxic things with a political landscape often lacking truth and honesty, and where the intention is, too often, manipulation, looks to me like the Devil's playground.

The Christian faith is rooted in love, and this is unconditional love. Our neighbours matter, and the way that we treat them says a great deal about our own faith and character. We cannot keep our religion in one part of our mind and deal with the world using a separate part where love is less persuasive.

Boxgrove School has just adopted, as its new faith declaration, that important verse from the letter of Saint John: "God is love and those who live in love live in God, and God lives in them."

This would be a good verse for us all to ponder, and I wish it were better known by those who think themselves civilised and yet are behaving in, and speaking of others in, an abhorrent way.

Let us pray, earnestly, that we and others in our society may value truth and love, and see these things as essential in a world which seems increasingly fragmented.

Report from the Parish Council

The Village Fête was a well attended affair, and I thank the organising team for what was an enjoyable afternoon. Lots of hard work went into it and this was rewarded with many smiling faces. Lots to see and do - the collection of Classic Cars was a delight to see, and so many of them from within the Village.



The local area has once again been terrorised by marauding Gypsies and Travellers recently. Oaklands Park, Tangmere Airfield, two or three sites around Bognor, including the Bognor Rugby Club. It always worries me when they are on the move - whether the car park barrier has been left open and unattended. They only need a few minutes and they are in. I hope others are as concerned as I am and keep a watchful eye on any need of the barrier being open.

The Parish Council has received two Planning Applications for the felling of trees. One concerns the huge monkey puzzle tree by the allotments and two other insignificant cypress of only about 3 metres. The monkey puzzle, the biggest I've ever seen - about 18 metres high - is dying, with some lower limbs ready to fall any when. The other is for some substantial felling of trees within the cartilage of Flint Walls. I know some of the limbs which overhang the wall in Church Lane have been of great concern to some of the residents, so if this application is approved some good will be done.

You all should have noticed that the Boxgrove School Safety Zone has been installed ready for use when the new school term begins. Once again, this is yet another achievement for the Parish Speed Watch team, as part of the Community Highways Safety scheme. These volunteers have worked so hard and achieved so much they are to be congratulated once again. And there's more to come! We must also remember the co-operation of WSCC through the guidance of Chris Dye, our area Highways Manager, and the support of Councillor Jeremy Hunt. The next imminent action will be the movement of the northbound 55 bus stop sign, at the southern end of The Street, to a new position about 30 metres further south to a wider area of pavement. There will also be a seat positioned for the convenience of waiting passengers, and maybe even a shelter.

The development of the new housing is progressing well: I've been advised now they are all waterproof and ought to be finished by October/November. Those residents of Priors Acre and the southern end of The Street will be delighted when the last of the construction vehicles leave - it has been quite a nightmare.

After the August break the Parish Council will next meet again on September 2nd at 7pm in the Village Community Hall: all are welcome to attend.

THE OPTIMISTIC GARDENER

High Trees - August 2019 - No.26

The Optimistic Gardener All Muck and Magic - Part I (The Muck)

Back in the eighties you were still considered to be a bit of a lentil-eating, yoga-practising hippie if you dabbled with organic gardening. Unless of course you were a Windsor and had just bought the Highgrove Estate.

So in 1988 when we moved to High Trees we felt we were in good company in our decision to set about gardening the acre plot organically. Prince Charles had a slightly larger task on his hands, but then he wasn't doing it all himself! It just so happened that, in the year before we moved, Channel 4 screened one of the most popular gardening programmes of the day, with 3.5 million viewers regularly. It was called 'All Muck & Magic'. I think that programme, more than anything else, guided our plans to do this the hard way.

The phrase All Muck and Magic was originally used by the agricultural scientist Albert Howard about Rudolph Steiner. Steiner was an Austrian philosopher and polymath who believed in an ecological and sustainable approach to agriculture and was very keen on manure and composting. Howard dismissed the Steiner approach to agriculture as no more than "muck and mystery".

One of the most influential books of the 20th century with regard to environmental matters was *The Silent Spring* by American, Rachel Carson. Published in 1962 it talked about the liberal use of pesticides and the disinformation about their risks put about by chemical manufacturers. In 1972 the use of DDT was banned in the US but nevertheless there are still places in the States where 'it is common practice to drench urban and suburban areas with insecticides, dropped either from aeroplanes or sprayed as a toxic fog from large tankers that patrol the streets'⁽¹⁾. Thank goodness we live in the UK.



Well, back in 1988 we decided to embrace the ideas of the organic movement and one of the earliest jobs we did in the garden was to plant a bed of comfrey. This is a plant which is the *Lucozade* of the plant world. It can be used in a variety of ways - chopped up and steeped in water for a few weeks it makes a vile-smelling brew which can be poured directly onto plants as a fertiliser.

We use a slightly different, though equally smelly, process. We cut down the comfrey about four times over the growing season and stuff the leaves into an empty water

butt. This too reduces to a dark foul libation and needs to be diluted 20:1 with water. I have the unenviable job of decanting the liquid gold into large lemonade bottles which we store in the greenhouse and use regularly over the growing season. (I had a mischievous thought about any trespasser coming into the greenhouse and seeing a Coke bottle full of the brown stuff and helping themselves to a thirst-quenching swig!) A particularly loathsome part of this whole exercise is when, after several stuffings, the water butt needs to be emptied of the remaining slime. You don't want to wear your good clothes for this job, and make sure that you are not inviting anyone to supper for a few nights after it's done!

The comfrey we planted is a variety called Bocking 14; this is a strain of the plant developed by Lawrence Hills (founder of the Henry Doubleday Research Association, now called *Garden Organic*) which is rich in nutrients, especially potash. It has very deep roots which draw the nutrients up from below. Ours is planted in a bed from which it can't escape - surrounded by brick wall and concrete paths. It is advisable to restrain its growth as in the wrong hands it could be considered to be a thug! It is one of the very few garden plants which can tolerate a barrow load of unrotted stable manure, or the guano from the chicken shed. It can also be used in its leaf form as a mulch, or put directly onto the compost heap.

We grow other green manures, too. With our raised bed system there are times of the year when there are empty beds, and rather than leaving bare soil we sow the ground with the seed of *Phacelia tanacetifolia*. Properly used as a green manure it is best dug into the soil before the flowers open, but the blooms are so attractive to bees and hoverflies that we can't bare to do this with all the plants. The *Phacelia* helps improve the soil fertility (horticultural vitamin pills), improves the soil structure (horticultural body building), acts as a weed suppressant (instead of the dreaded black plastic) and even can act as a form of pest control (those hoverflies do hoover up a large number of aphids).

And of course there is always the 'muck' of a different colour. As well as green manure we are surrounded by creators of brown manure. Sussex must be one of the horsiest counties in England. Certainly in the Barnham area we have land which is covered with glasshouses or horses! Either side of our house in Barnham we have stables, and owners keen to rid themselves of the stuff. We have to collect it ourselves, naturally, and it is not particularly well-rotted - in fact it is quite common to see steam rising from the heap. We load the trailer up several times (10 trips this year), drive 20 yards down the road and wheel-barrow the contents to the manure clamp - we have to leave it for a year to rot down. Now we have a dual storage clamp; one side is the manure-to-go and the other side is covered up with old carpet and left for a year!

What a lot of trouble just to get something to throw on the ground! But boy! - you should see the soil on our vegetable beds. We never need to dig because we don't compact the ground by treading on it, and the weeds which inevitably grow in there can be removed with a hoe or a stern look! Each year most beds get a dose of the brown stuff and we now have the most amazing prize-winning crops in our vegetable patch. (I am lying - I don't even go in for competitions - although the carrots



last year could have gone in for the class 'Vegetable most like its owner).

Recipe - Healthy Granola

with many thanks to Sally Bosson

Ingredients

- 4 cups old-fashioned rolled oats
- I ½ cup raw nuts and/or seeds (eg I cup pecans and ½ cup pumpkin seeds)
- I teaspoon fine-grain sea salt (if using standard table salt scale back to 3/4 teaspoon)
- ½ teaspoon ground cinnamon
- ½ cup melted coconut oil or olive oil (olive makes it more savoury)
- ½ cup maple syrup or honey
- I teaspoon vanilla extract
- ²/₃ cup dried fruit, chopped if large (I used dried cranberries)
- Totally optional additional mix-ins: ½ cup chocolate chips or *coconut flakes You can also add other spices, grated zest, ginger ground or candied etc

Instructions

- 1. Preheat oven to 350 degrees Fahrenheit; line a large, rimmed baking sheet with parchment paper.
- 2. In large mixing bowl, combine oats, nuts and/or seeds, salt & cinnamon; stir.
- 3. Pour in the oil, maple syrup/honey & vanilla. Mix well, until every oat & nut is lightly coated. Pour granola onto prepared pan and use a large spoon to spread evenly.
- 4. Bake until lightly golden, about 21-24 mins, stirring halfway. (For extra-clumpy granola, press the stirred granola down with your spatula to create a more even layer). The granola will further crisp up as it cools.
- 5. Let the granola cool completely, undisturbed (at least 45 mins). Top with dried fruit (and optional chocolate chips). Break the granola into pieces with your hands if you want to retain big chunks, or stir it around with a spoon if you don't want extra-clumpy granola.
- 6. Store in an airtight container at room temperature for 1 to 2 weeks, or in a sealed freezer bag in the freezer for up to 3 months. Warm to room temperature for 5-10 mins before serving.

Probably an American cup, but you just use the same cup it doesn't really matter but you can add a little more of the flavouring.

* If you want to include coconut flakes, stir them into the granola halfway through baking. That way they'll get nice and toasty.

John C Athron May 1933 - June 2019

(From the eulogy given at his funeral by his son)

John was born into a prosperous Doncaster family, attended Hill House Prep School and then boarded at Oundle School. Academic work was never very far up his to-do list: he used much of his time there to fine-tune his life-and-soul

skills, but most importantly, his lifelong love for music, particularly singing.

National Service and Sandhurst led to a commission in the Royal Artillery in 1954. He was stationed at Shoeburyness, where he had the opportunity to continue sailing and to skipper the Gunners Yacht Club racing yacht, the St Barbara.

John's next posting was to the Army School of Flying at Middle Wallop, where he became one of the first army helicopter pilots, serving in

Germany, Hong Kong and later as a Press Officer at Colchester. He left the army in 1978 with the rank of Major and joined Marconi Defence Systems and later Jane's Defence Review magazine.

He retired in the 1990s and moved to Tangmere. Here he continued his sailing and singing, joining the choir at Boxgrove Priory, and even continuing to come to choir practices to listen when he retired from regular Sunday singing. He had been a member of the Royal Choral Society, singing under Malcolm Sargent.

His cheerfulness and often slightly naughty sense of humour remained to the end in spite of the vascular dementia in his last days. He is very much missed.

Francis Pott, in his wonderful hymn Angel voices ever singing, writes:

Craftsman's art and music's measure For thy pleasure all combine.

This seems a fitting description of our flower festival here at Boxgrove in June.

Our theme In Quires and places where they sing saw a perfect blending of beautifully crafted flower arrangements and wonderful choral music to make this a truly memorable event. The hard work, talent and skill of all involved made this such a happy occasion, and I should like to thank all who worked so hard over not only the days of the festival but also the year of preparation before. There were naturally moments of anxiety, but these were nothing compared to the fun, laughter and good will which surrounded the whole event. BOXGROVE & HALNAKER TRAFFIC CALMING GROUP UPDATE

September 2019

Boxgrove School Safety Zone – The new signage and flashing light system for the 20mph zone outside the school has now been installed by WSCC Highways. This system will reinforce the need for drivers to slow down to a maximum of 20mph when the children are arriving at school in the morning and leaving in the afternoon.

Boxgrove/Halnaker Community Highway Schemes (CHS) The Halnaker scheme has successfully passed the first phase of vetting by WSCC Highways and will now be included in the September moderation phase for final approval. We are hopeful the scheme will get full approval allowing feasibility work to commence in 2020.



The working group have also been exploring additional sources of funding for the improvements to the Windmill rest area which are in the CHS. Rees Jeffreys Road Fund have offered £30,000 if the plan meets their criteria. Work is ongoing to secure this funding; we will keep you updated on progress.

Regarding the Boxgrove CHS, we are waiting for WSCC to present their feasible designs to us shortly. Early indications are that much of the scheme is feasible and can be delivered subject to the costs being contained in the allocated budget. We will let you know when we have more news.

Southern Boxgrove bus stop - WSCC has confirmed that they now have the Traffic Officer's approval to relocate the southern bus stop further south, away from the narrow footway where it is difficult to pass. We have received notification that Stagecoach will be moving the bus stop flag shortly. The Parish Council will look to improve the facilities at the relocated bus stop to include a bench, a litter bin and possibly, in time, a shelter. The Traffic Calming Group will also work with WSCC Highways as part of the CHS to review any further works required at the new bus stop location to improve usability and accessibility.

Community Speed Watch - Did you know that in a one hour period the

Halnaker Speed Watch Team typically see 500 vehicles pass by. **5**% of those vehicles are recorded and reported speeding at over 35mph in the 30 mph zone.




