

From Father Dominic.....

Dear Sisters and Brothers,

I'm writing this first Bugle letter to you in our home in Brighton, surrounded by packing boxes and chaotic piles of stuff. Like all transitions it is unsettling — Where is the potato masher? Why did you put the passports behind the microwave? — but it is also exciting. I'm so looking forward to coming to Boxgrove, settling into a new home, praying with you in your splendid church, and getting to know you all. I do hope you'll be able to come to the licensing mass on Wednesday 19 November at 7.30pm, which will be celebrated by Bishop



Martin, and when I will begin ministry as your parish priest.

I'm originally from Huntingdonshire, but had two childhood spells in beautiful, wildly different Botswana. After my parents separated I was brought up by my mother on a council estate in St Neots, near Bedford. I took myself to church and found there a loving community, and the richness of Christian thought and spirituality, which formed my path into adulthood. Somehow I managed to get a university place at Keble College, Oxford. My own sense of vocation grew alongside a love of academic work, and my discernment of God's call ran alongside my studies. My specialist subject is the early Church, and particularly the theology of St Augustine of Hippo, the great North African Bishop. While I was writing my doctorate I met Elliott, my partner and ever-tolerant companion for the last eighteen years.

I was ordained deacon in 2012 and served the first part of my title in Wantage, a market town in south Oxfordshire. In 2014 I returned to Oxford to be Chaplain of Brasenose College, and completed my curacy at St Mary Mag's, a church in the centre of the city. Although I enjoyed being back in Oxford and working as a chaplain, I missed the rhythms of life in a parish, and was delighted to be appointed as Vicar of St Nicholas' Brighton in 2017. Ministering in Brighton has been stimulating, challenging and full of joy; and it has been a privilege to serve a wonderful congregation and community in this fascinating city over nearly nine years. With thankfulness for what has been, I'm looking forward to beginning a new chapter with you, and exploring where the Holy Spirit might lead us as we live a shared life in Christ.

Elliott is CTO of a biomedical company near Uckfield, and writes complicated healthcare software which I (and most people) don't understand. In my spare time I

read, cook, and attempt gardening, which I suspect will require some upskilling in Boxgrove. Our favourite treat is travelling to European spa towns to be steamed/boiled/frozen, apparently for good health. Among the things I most love about being a parish priest are visiting, ministry in schools and with children, and praying together.

These are just a few words to give you a flavour of the person who is about to turn up, and I've already run over my word-limit. Please pray for us as we load the chaotic boxes into the van and make our way to you; and pray also for the people of St Nicholas', as they begin a period of interregnum. I'll certainly be praying for you, and look forward to talking face to face very soon.



Report on Ride & Stride 2025

Following on from the 2 rather disastrous previous years for Ride & Stride, (2023 heat-stroke half-way round, 2024 a damaged elbow a week prior), I decided to take a new approach. A few months before the said weekend, (always clashing with Revival), I added a little note in this here Bugle, to see if anyone else wanted to join me for a conservative, local Family ride, possibly involving cake. Having been inundated with replies, NOT, I once again set out on my own, with a plan to try out an Individual TT race that had been in the back of my mind for a couple of years.



For those that don't know, TT stands for Time Trial and is basically a race against yourself and the clock. You are not allowed to team up with other riders for pace and definitely no drafting, (riding close behind others). The route I planned was to leave Boxgrove nice and early so the roads would be quiet, ride to Arundel along the A27, round Arundel Cathedral and back along the A27 to Chichester. Spin round Chichester Cathedral and then back to Boxgrove, Spire-to-Spire.

memories of childhood, riding from Arundel to Worthing on my bike to spend my pocket-money in the model shops. I didn't time myself back in the 80's but this year managed my 36km Spire-to-Spire in 1 Hour, 25 Minutes.

BOXGROVE PARISH COUNCIL

From the Parish Council, October 2025



The Parish Council met on the 6th October, two apologies for absence were received. There were three Planning applications on the Agenda, two were for minor trimming of trees for householders and the third was for the erection of a storage barn for agricultural/ viticultural machinery on the Vineyard at Tinwood. This was what is known as a prior notice order, a PNO. which means merely that agricultural buildings below a certain size enjoy permitted development rights once the Notice is served. The tree works applied for were trivial and any decision should be left to the CDC Tree Officer. Attention was drawn to a presentation on the following evening the 7th, to consider Renewable Energy in the Countryside under the umbrella of Energise South Downs which is supported by the SDNPA. It was an interesting presentation focusing on any potential sites in the Parish. About 60% of the Parish lies within the SDNP so there is little scope there. Wind farms or solar farms would not "conserve nor enhance the natural beauty of the landscapes and wildlife of the NP"

The existing Planning application for the nine dwellings on land adjacent to 'The Folly' in Halnaker was briefly considered, and unsure of any recommendation by Planning Officers, an application has been made for the application to be decided by the Council Planning Committee.

There has been a certain amount of confusion regarding the grass cutting of the playing field. Fortunately it was just about short enough for the successful Annual Dog Show to go ahead. One operator of the new mower has injured his back and another committee member of the Cricket Club is unwell so reliance has been on an outside contractor to tend to it. As I write this, I understand the Chairman of the CC has arranged a rota to operate the mower so hopefully this has been resolved.. We have received from CDC a commemorative wreath to lay at the memorial in the Parish Church on Remembrance Sunday this year on the 9th of November. CDC are also once again offering a number of free tree saplings which we will apply for, they have this time around included fruit trees in the selection, so we welcome any ideas from you, the community, for suitable locations to plant them. The PC vice chairman and I attended the CDC Meeting with the Parishes on Monday 13/10 and one item on the Agenda was a presentation on Parish Emergency Resilience Plans and I'm pleased to say that what Julian, Viv Mills and a few others have achieved towards our Plan to date, puts us well ahead of the game. Once we find some safe, accessible by the team, storage space we can take delivery of the kit promised by WSCC. There are some items we have deemed unnecessary but we'll take what we feel we need. I wrote to the guy who made the presentation and

explained in fair detail what we have achieved and the preparations made and his reply was very complimentary, so well done all of you who have contributed. It has been a good effort.

In case you missed it, the Coffee Morning in support of the MacMillan Nurses Organisation was extremely well attended throughout the morning and I'm told over £800.00 was raised. So a big pat on the back for Sally and her daughter Faye and for all those generous folk who donated cake and biscuits for the occasion. Thank you all! The next meeting of the Council will be on November 3rd during which we shall be setting our budget and the Precept for the year '26/'27. All are welcome to attend, we've had a few lately but it would be nice to see even more. That's it for this month.

Music for Voices and Viols, from Dowland to Purcell Cambridge Renaissance Voices with Fretwork

Sunday 16th November 7.30p.m. in the Priory

Cambridge Renaissance Voices return to the glorious acoustic of Boxgrove Priory for a special concert with *Fretwork*, acclaimed by the London Evening Standard as 'the finest viol consort on the planet'.

The seventeenth century was the golden age of English consort music, when voices and viols were used interchangeably or together. Viol consorts were central to domestic music-making, in part-songs or madrigals equally suited to string players or singers. A parallel tradition developed in church music, featuring vocally inspired instrumental polyphony and bringing voices and viols together in the verse anthem, whose greatest Jacobean exponents included Thomas Weelkes, and Orlando Gibbons whose 400th anniversary we celebrate this year. After the Restoration, the music of Henry Purcell represents in many ways the culmination of this rich tradition. While his anthems straddle the musical styles of the late Renaissance and a more dramatic idiom signalling the early Baroque, Purcell's viol Fantasias look back to an earlier age, bringing to an old instrumental form a dazzling complexity and musical beauty.


The Optimistic Gardener More sticky stuff

What a season it has been for many fruits in the summer of 2025!

My mother would have every last piece of fruit converted into something to squirrel away in the larder. Our house was one in which we could have survived a siege of several months. The winter of 1963 held no fears for us. We were near enough to shops, but we could have been isolated out in the wilds and have managed with very little inconvenience. Mum had a pantry under the stairs lined floor to ceiling with shelves groaning with tins of food. Further back were packets of biscuits, (fig rolls were always a favourite), sugar of various hues, flours (especially her strong flour for bread making), dried pastas, rice, beans, lentils, pearl barley, packets of Corn Flakes, slabs of cooking chocolate (only if you were desperate for a sugar rush would you sneak

into the larder for a piece of this).

Having run out of space in the pantry we spilled over into the garage where could be found a large chest freezer containing much of the produce my father had grown - runner beans, broad beans, peas, raspberries, currants (black and red). On shelves in there were trays of our own apples, pears and pumpkins as well as all the preserves and chutneys clearly labelled and sometimes dating back several years! The house was built on to a slope so underneath the kitchen floor, accessed through a trapdoor, was what we laughingly called the cellar, and it was here that we stored the homemade wines (elderberry, elderflower, sloe, dandelion, blackberry) and my father's homemade beers.



This year we have had an abundance of strawberries, apricots, plums, peaches, apples, pears and quinces. And, having turned into my mother, I was determined to preserve as much of this harvest as possible. But there is limited space in the 2 freezers so, as in days of yore, I have turned to making preserves and chutneys as well as more modern delicacies.

Fruit leather doesn't sound as though it is going to be very appealing. I had seen it for sale in packets designed to be attractive to children with names such as *Frutina fruit snacks* and *Bear Fruit Splits*. I have to say I rather spurned these snacks, thinking they would be full of e-numbers and sugar (which they are not). But when our apricot tree produced more fruits than we could easily eat fresh, I decided to have a go at preserving them. Now I am not a jam eater myself, and Gerry prefers his jams on the sharp side, so apricot jam was not really an option.

Google to the rescue - "What to do with a glut of apricots?" Here's what Al said:

With a glut of apricots, you can make sweet preserves like jam, chutney, or fruit leather, or bake them into pies, tarts, cakes, and scones. You can also freeze fresh apricots for later use, or dehydrate them to make healthy snacks and versatile ingredients for other recipes. For savoury dishes, apricot can be used in chicken, lamb, or pork dishes, often with Middle Eastern-inspired flavours.

Well - since the freezer had enough space for one apricot scone, and I haven't got the taste for apricot jam or chutney - I decided to have a go at making apricot leather. My Good Housekeeping

Complete Book of Home Preserving dated 1981 says nothing about fruit leathers, so it was Google to the rescue once more. The initial process couldn't have been simpler.

I baked the surplus apricots in the oven and then liquidised them to a pulp. I stirred in a small amount of sugar and then spread the pulp on three baking sheets covered with baking parchment. This was popped in a cool oven (90°C) for a few hours. The site I used to learn about making this fruit leather must have been from the US where the author had been able to put the trays in the sunshine to evaporate. If I had done this, I would have ended up with a sprinkling of insect life which would stick to the leather like they might to a fly paper.

Since my first triumph, I have used a surplus of plums and peaches in the same way. They will keep for a few weeks in the fridge or, as I did, they can be frozen for the long fruitless days of winter.

Another fruit we have had in abundance this year is blackcurrants. Now on their own they are quite tart and create a burst of sparkle to fruit salad but not something you would want to eat a bowl of. However they make a fabulous jam. But you can find recipes for blackcurrant jam all over the place; one thing I like to do with my glut of blackcurrants is to make a cordial and then freeze it.

The recipe only requires 3 ingredients - sugar, lemons and blackcurrants. They are boiled together and then strained through a muslin-lined sieve and put into sterilised bottles. I use plastic pint milk bottles as these freeze well and even better, they stack beautifully in the freezer.

People who would normally turn up their noses at Ribena go mad for my artisan blackcurrant cordial. It all depends on the spin! I like it served with some fizzy water or tonic, but I suppose you could follow the example of the old queen mother and have it in place of Dubonnet in a gin cocktail!

My final glut of the year tends to be the quince harvest, and this year is no exception. I suppose I could also make a fruit leather from this, but my go-to preserve of quinces is Membrillo - a thick jelly-like paste made with quinces and sugar. It is a Spanish delicacy which goes well with cheese - especially Manchego.



As a gardener myself, I completely understand the appeal. When my sons were young, our garden was full


